i.	<b>Budget Submission 2023/24 for ratification</b> The School Business Manager presented the budget and reiterated that the carry forward would be £591,000, out of that some money has been moved onto new budget lines totalling £56 000 to cover already committed spends. An additional £48 000 has been identified for items the school would like to make purchase outside standard budget items. On the report it records that the budget will move towards being in deficit by 2024/25 the system generates staff salary increases etc, the LA funding is not yet set moving forward so this is an unknown factor.	

The Head and the Business Manager were comfortable that the prediction would not amount to the school being in deficit in 2024/25 and that there were areas of the budget that could be adjusted i.e., staffing structure, pupil numbers, LA funding.

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	<ul> <li>prediction would not amount to the school being in deficit in 2024/25 and that there were areas of the budget that could be adjusted i.e., staffing structure, pupil numbers, LA funding.</li> <li>Q./ A governor asked - If there is a wish list of current things to spend the money, is this prudent to spend the carry forward now?</li> <li>A./ The Head stated - Whilst it might seem counter intuitive, the school was in the same position last year and carried on with a wish list spend and the school has a healthy carry forward going into the next financial year.</li> <li>Q./ A governor noted that there appeared to be a large sum (£18,000) sitting in the maths budget and asked - is this correct?</li> <li>A./ The School Business Manager stated that this was an error in the input of the figures – It should read £1852.00 and this will be corrected once the system has reopened.</li> <li>The finance link governor made the point that the income coming into the school in future years is the unknown factor, but the spend is measured.</li> <li>The School Business Manager informed the governors that the school financial end data had been submitted to County for first approval and had been accepted in its current format.</li> <li>The governing body were in full agreement to ratify the school budget for 2023/24. The budget will be submitted to County by 12<sup>th</sup> May 2023</li> </ul>

7	School Improvement	
i	Pupil Data Presentation by Colette McNally	
	The governors were given a set of reports detailing the current school data. The data was broken down into school year groups. CM gave a brief explanation of how data is gathered based on the summative and formative assessment undertaken by the class teachers.	
	<b>Key headlines</b> In general, the pupils are making good progress in reading, writing and maths and has increased from Summer 1 to Spring 2.	
	In general, attainment across the school is on the increase. On drilling down further into the data there are concerns around year 2 being behind in maths against the previous year's data. Areas for improvement and evidence gathering have been identified to improve these outcomes rapidly.	
	Q./ A governor asked – how are the pupil premium and the SEND pupils doing in terms of progress.	
	A./ CM responded - Pupil premium and SEND pupils are not making the same levels of progress and the interventions are being monitored. These pupils are not making the same level of progress as those that are not pupil premium or SEND.	
	<ul> <li>Q./ A governor asked - Has covid made an impact on the current year 2?</li> <li>A./ CM responded – there are a number of factors that may be making an impact (not necessarily Covid), there is a high level of lower attainers in the cohort and SEND pupils. There is also an element of cautious judgment from the teaching staff.</li> </ul>	
	EYFS – the baseline is quite low, there is a dip in writing and there has been support to help staff get writing across the broader curriculum. Maths is looking positive.	
	Year 1 phonics screening test is showing at 62% reaching the pass mark of 32 or more now and the prediction is that 82% will be at the expected pass rate by then end of year 1.	
	Q./ A governor asked - Are the children that didn't reach the pass mark on the year 1 phonics screening in previous years likely to pass now?	
	A./ CM responded - There are a number of children that still have gaps and may still not pass the retakes in year 2. There are intervention groups in place to support these pupils.	
	Q./ A governor asked - Are these pupils making progress even though they will not reach the pass mark? A./ CM responded - Yes, they are, although it is slow.

	The report had been made available to the governors on Teams. The Head gave a verbal overview of the SDP. It was noted that the EYFS staff had been out to visit an outstanding provision. The staff were being offered the opportunity to go out and visit schools that are outstanding/good to gain a broad overview of provision being provided in different settings. All staff had been able to engage in CPD around improving practice and moderation.

Year 6 writing is moderated. It was noted that a request had been put into Sue Bowman for moderation of all key stages.

	A new SEND TA has been employed on a fixed term contract to begin in May. Appointment of an ECT to replace Miss Bird and a Computing Teacher has been employed for 2 days a week both effective from September 2023.	
	School Development Plan	
	This had been made available to the governors prior to the meeting. It was noted that History would be a focus for the summer term. EYFS training for all teachers would be postponed until next year. Development of a house system would also be moved into the next academic year. Zones of regulation was in place for the summer term.
