



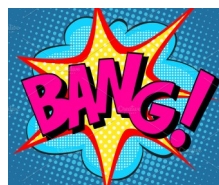
## Pop Art – Painting

Pop art is art inspired by things from popular culture. It became popular in the 1960s. Pop art is usually very eye catching and uses bright, bold colours. Pop art usually consists of repeated patterns or onomatopoeia words.

Key Vocabulary	
artist	a person who creates paintings, drawings and sculptures
brush stroke	a mark made by a paint brush on a surface
mark making	using different tools to create different shapes, lines and patterns
primary colour	there are 3 primary colours: red, yellow and blue
secondary colour	these are the colours that you get when you mix 2 primary colours together e.g blue + yellow = green
eye catching	something that gets someone's attention easily
repeated patterns	a pattern that is painted over and over again
onomatopoeia	a word that sounds like what it means

### Andy Warhol

Andy Warhol was an American pop artist. He became a well-known artist in the 1960s when he began screen printing. Andy Warhol took everyday things and turned them into works of art by painting with bright, unrealistic colours. One of his most famous pieces of work is a repeated print of Marilyn Monroe. Some of his other most famous pieces of art are of a soup tin, a Coca-Cola bottle and a banana.

### Tertiary Colours

Primary + Secondary = Tertiary

YELLOW	+ ORANGE	= YELLOW-ORANGE
RED	+ ORANGE	= RED-ORANGE
RED	+ VIOLET	= RED-VIOLET
BLUE	+ VIOLET	= BLUE-VIOLET
BLUE	+ GREEN	= BLUE-GREEN
YELLOW	+ GREEN	= YELLOW-GREEN

### Foreground and Background

In art, the foreground and background are the front and back of a picture.

The background are the colours that are painted first.

The foreground is what you can see at the front of the painting.
